Help fill the Grocery Cart in the Gathering Space

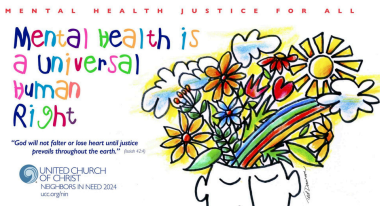
This Sunday

A Message to the Congregation

We have notified our tenants about the asbestos abatement process with the attached Memo.

Due to a flood in our church basement several years ago, some of the floor tiles became loose and were a trip hazard. As a part of the repair process the tiles, the adhesive and the air in the basement were tested for asbestos due to their age. No asbestos was found in the air or the tiles. There was a small amount of asbestos found in the adhesive, however the level found was below the threshold established by the Maine DEP.

The attached memo was sent to the 4 tenants of the basement explaining the remediation process. In summary there are no asbestos concerns at this time.

As a precaution we also conducted testing for mold, bacteria and Radon. Airborne Radon was found at levels slightly higher than Maine DEP recommendations. We have solicited proposals from two local abatement companies and will be proceeding with remediation as soon as resources are available. We will keep you posted on our progress and new testing results as the information becomes available.

Status of testing for asbestos in the old church basement:

1. Testing for airborne asbestos results were negative. The testing was done by Octagon Cleaning & Restoration.
2. Testing of the VCT tiles from the old church basement was negative. Materials have been ordered.
3. Testing of the adhesive on the tiles from the old church basement found levels of asbestos below the threshold for regulation as specified by the Maine DEP.
4. Tiles that were removed from the hallway in the old church basement and placed in the boiler room were removed by Octagon Cleaning & Restoration abatement company on Thursday, September 26.

Next steps:

1. The area in the hallway by the bathrooms that was previously painted will be retiled with new VCT materials. Based on our current commitment made by our supplier this work will take place within 45 days of this notice.
2. The old boiler room that has loose VCT tiles with adhesive that contains unregulated amounts of asbestos will be posted and secured from access by the public until a future date when abatement can be completed by Octagon Cleaning & Restoration.
