Devotional Material Collected


WFST radio station in Caribou, ME collects devotional material. They then send it to missionaries around the world.

NYCC's Street Ministry meets State Street UCC's "Clothes Closet"

A bit of the backstory here.....for several months our street ministry folks have done their normal monthly trip to Portland bearing lunches, warm socks, hats and snacks and plenty of peanut butter cup treats, returning to NYCC with much of our goods coming back with us! We just weren't finding folks on the street. There is a correlation, of course between more shelter space becoming available and Preble Street food trucks going out on a more frequent schedule. This is all very good news. There is a lot more work to be done in this area, but I feel Portland is addressing the situation a little more aggressively.

All this leading up to "what do we do with the amazing supply of warm clothing you folks have given to our ministry"? We found out that the State Street Church opens its doors 3 days a month (the first 3 Wednesdays every month from1 to 3) to the unhoused and immigrants who need clothing or personal care items, or a bag of treats. Amanda and I took a huge load of goods to them about a month ago.....they were so grateful, but we didn't get to observe the operation. Why? Because we weren't there on a Wednesday!

Last Wednesday I called the person in charge, asked if I could visit and observe, and bring in some product that we had. I went in with shoes, a warm jacket, personal care items, some socks and snacks. The "store" is set up in the church basement, small rooms labeled for age, gender or specific types of clothing. Some rooms the users could go in and browse by themselves, other rooms were gated and a worker was serving the client from the doorway. I sat in a central space that had racks of clothing and a bench. I sat on the bench, wanting to stay out of the way. That worked for a while, then a woman plopped her tote on my lap and through nonverbal directions got me to hold her bag open so she could put the articles of clothing she had picked out in with ease. I could not believe how many articles she got in that bag! I think the space where I was sitting was a "take as much as you want" area. Then I became aware that an eight or nine year boy had sat down beside me, hand held device in hand, taking pictures of me! I wasn't crazy about this situation, and what he was doing with the pictures was disconcerting. He kept turning me into grotesque figures, and he couldn't help but smile. Not one word was spoken. The church workers were really friendly folks, I felt totally at ease, and they were so thankful for what NYCC had sent into them. They make up bags of items like we do with personal care items, snacks, etc. Good stuff!

I do not know if our church will be interested in continuing with this kind of ministry. If you have any thoughts on this, I would be so pleased to chat it up with you. Your ideas and generosity are appreciated so much. What you did for our Street Ministry was over the top!
