From the Desk of Pastor Day

From the Desk of Pastor Day: Advent Candles

The first two weeks of December have been the coldest beginning to the month in 39 years! Every day has averaged below normal temperatures. Uff da! A slight warm-up is forecast for late week, but then back to the deep freeze. On top of that we are in the darkest week of the year. Double Uff da!

A friend recently wrote from Tromsø, Norway, where she has spent the fall semester teaching. There, above the Arctic Circle, the sun set on November 27th and will not re-appear until January 15th. Uff da, indeed! The Norwegians call this period "<u>mørketid</u>" – the "Dark Time" – or "<u>blåtid</u>" – the "Blue Time." Of course, the hardy locals do not let the cold or darkness stop them from enjoying outdoor winter sports or cozy times inside. One of the ways they cope with the cold and darkness is to light many candles.

As the familiar proverb says, "It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness." (The quote has been attributed to many different people, including Confucius and Eleanor Roosevelt, but the first public occurrence of it in print was in a collection of sermons by William Watkinson published in 1907.)

We light candles, too. Every week in Church we begin worship with lighting the two candles on the altar. On the third Sunday of the month we encourage lighting candles for prayers of Joy or Concerns. This month we are lighting the candles on the Advent Wreath, symbolizing Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. And on Christmas Eve we will light the Christ Candle, representing God's own Presence, and end worship singing "Silent Night" and lighting our own candles as a reminder to carry the Light of Christ with us out into the world.



The past few days have witnessed terrible incidents of violence: the ambush of U.S. military personnel in Syria, shooting on the campus of Brown University in Rhode Island, the terrorist attack on the first night of Hanukkah at Bondi Beach, Sydney, Australia, and the murder of Rob Reiner & his wife. And those are just the headlines against a continuing background of war, domestic violence, conflict, and division.

We could just curse the darkness, but it is far better to spread what light and warmth we may offer – to our family and friends, strangers and the wider community.

A late friend of mine used to find amusement in reminding everyone at the Summer Solstice that the days would be growing shorter for the next six months. The opposite is true as well. This coming Sunday is the shortest day of the year. But the days will be getting longer and longer from that point on for the next six months. More importantly, the Light has appeared.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overtake it. . . . And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth."
